### **Repopulating With Native Plants**

The greenhouse was filled with activity throughout 2007, culminating in over 4,000 plants that were planted on the San Pablo Bay National Wildlife Refuge during planting events with the help of LOTS of volunteers.

In June, Refuge staff and Refuge volunteers joined together for a planting at Tubbs Setback. 15 people planted over 600 plants in a single day!

During November, The Bay Institute, with their Students and Teachers Restoring A Watershed Program (STRAW), assisted at three planting events – bringing along over 40 volunteers for each event, made up mostly of 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade students. Each student planted nearly 400 plants each! Refuge volunteers Jim Millholland, Jim O'Neill, Lowell Sykes, and Tish Adams were also very helpful during the STRAW planting events.

Save the Bay had 3 events at upper Tolay where a variety of volunteer groups came and planted hundreds of plants.

And no plant was left behind; Friends Board Member Lowell Sykes took the remaining plants that were available after completing the Refuge plantings and placed them at nearby Audubon properties.

A GREAT BIG round of applause for all those who lent a hand bringing native species back to the Refuge. Volunteers rock!
